IT'S A LONG WAY FROM LONDON TO YACHATS!

We were very excited—our holiday plans for the summer of 2007 had been finalized. We had been invited to stay with some dear friends in Sacramento, CA, Portland, OR and....Yachats! "Where?" asked my wife Denise. "You know" I said, a little unsure of my pronunciation "Yachats, where Sue and Mike live!" I reached for my world atlas and, after a few hours, pinpointed Yachats for Denise to see.

The Internet is an amazing facility, even Google knows of Yachats. However, no amount of reading prepares you for the real thing. The Oregon coastline reminded me of my visits to New Zealand in the late sixties, where forests and grassland run down to beautiful beaches and an awe-inspiring ocean, and with only a modest two lane highway and the occasional lighthouse to evidence the intrusion of mankind.

Our home in Colchester, England is the oldest recorded town. It has a population of 105,000 and yet it does not have city status. Yachats is a city with a population of a few hundred residents. No wonder the UK and USA are described as two nations divided by a common language.

London, New York, and Hong Kong are cities; Yachats is a charming village with a most welcoming feel. The people I met, be they local or relocated from Los Angeles, were genuinely friendly and polite enough not to comment on our strange accents (we don't have accents—you do). The pace of life is one I aspire to enjoy if I could only slow down for long enough to think about it. I have been lucky enough to travel around the world quite extensively and it is important to me to gauge the 'feel' of a place. I felt very comfortable and relaxed in Yachats, and I was reminded of Bill Bryson's quest for the perfect American town "where friendly neighbors mow each other's lawns." I wonder whether he has visited Yachats yet.

Denise and I have visited eleven countries so far this year, and I have three favorite memories: the serenity of Olympia in Greece where the first Olympic Games were held; the vibrancy of Istanbul in Turkey; and the joy of watching whales frolicking in the Pacific Ocean whilst I was sipping a Mojito cocktail. We will return to Yachats!



Yachats Disaster Planning: Organizing Neighborhoods for Disaster Preparedness By Betty Johnston, CERT Team Leader

During the past few months a small core of Yachats citizens have been meeting to gather the

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information necessary to set up a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT).

Prepared neighborhood groups can make the difference between life and death for many individuals and families during and after a disaster.

The CERT Class Planning Committee is in the process of collecting information about individuals and families. An assessment survey is available throughout the community to help gather that information. The information then will be shared with the appropriate team and used during an emergency. If you have not already done so, please help us out by filling out one of the surveys available at City Hall, SW Lincoln County Water District, Yachats Fire Hall, Bank of the West, and the Yachats Visitors Center. The Committee will then use this information to form teams utilizing skills they have identified.

As soon as the CERT Class Planning Committee has taken all the steps needed to start classes, we will notify citizens to attend.

In the meantime, take the first step and attend an ARE YOU READY? class. The next class is scheduled for March 8, 2008 in Room 8 at the Yachats Commons. The class is free. Call (541) 547-4934 to reserve a space.



**City Continues
Emergency Planning**

The City's Emergency Planning Steering Committee recently sent out a survey titled "Household Natural Hazards Preparedness Questionnaire" with January's water/sewer bills. The survey will be used to collect different data than the CERT survey and is part of the Mitigation and Recovery process.

Recently two committee members attended a FEMA training course that focuses on the recovery and mitigation phases of emergency management.

Having recovery and pre-disaster mitigation plans in place help ensure that the community is able to access FEMA funds to the fullest extent possible. FEMA will not help pay for anything that is not in an established plan.

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Recovery from a major disaster can take years and can completely change the community unless the recovery and mitigation efforts are undertaken with a clear vision of what the residents want the community to look like ten years down the road.

While it is important to rebuild the infrastructure as quickly as possible following a disaster, it is equally important that the way the community is rebuilt will result in a close fit with that vision.

During the committee's most recent meeting there were discussions about the storm even that occurred on December 2 and 3, 2007.

One of the items of mitigation was the use of the kitchen at the Commons. There is a generator in the Commons that starts immediately when a power outage takes place. The Committee agreed, as did the City Council, that an hour after a power outage begins the kitchen inside the Commons would be available for those who would like use of it. The kitchen is equipped with stove, refrigerator, coffee maker and tables and chairs. The gym will also be available as a shelter and use of the restrooms will accessible during most disasters.

During severe wind/rainstorms the Commons works well as a shelter. However, all residents should evacuate to the safety zone approximately 60' above Hwy 101 during a tsunami since the Commons is in a potential inundation zone.



City Council Business

During January's City Council meeting, Public Works Director McClintock reported:

- The City is eligible for FEMA reimbursements for expenses related to the December's wind/rainstorm since Lincoln County was included in the disaster declaration. The total in damages and overtime expenses came to about \$13,000. The City anticipates financial reimbursement of approximately 75%.

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- Work has begun on the engineering for the sidewalk improvements authorized by the City Council last month.
- The mobile storage units for the emergency supplies should be delivered by the end of the month.

Marine Reserves to Be Discussed at Upcoming City Council Work Session

The creation of marine reserves off of Oregon's shores is a complex issue and the Yachats City Council feels that they (and the community) need a lot more information about the topic. Onno Husing, Executive Director for the Oregon Coastal Zone Management Association (OCZMA) has been asked to attend the February 11, 2008 City Council work session to discuss the marine reserves with the Council and any one else who is interested in the subject.

OCZMA, coastal communities, the fishing community, and others have expressed concerns related to the creation of marine reserves. Those concerns include such things as the necessity and desirability of creating the reserves; economic impact; monitoring and enforcement; funding; development of desired outcomes and evaluation of those outcomes; access restrictions both in the water and on the shore; and adequate public involvement in the process.

The public is invited to attend the work session on February 11, 2008 at 9:30 a.m. to learn more.

In Other City Council Business

Council adopted Resolution No. 2008-01-01 Amending the 2007-2008 Fiscal Year Budget. The Resolution was necessary to allocate funds for the storm drain study and engineering study the City Council authorized at the December 2007 meeting,

The Council recognized a grant the Library received from the State for their "Ready to Read?" program. And Maggie Marshall and Carol Summers were reappointed to the Library Commission, with terms expiring December 2010.



Yachats Comprehensive Plan Update By Larry Lewis, City Planner

The Yachats Planning Commission has forwarded a recommendation to the City Council to adopt the updated Comprehensive Plan.

The City's comprehensive plan addresses statewide planning goals and local land use planning needs and issues. The plan responds to the desires, needs, and aspirations of the citizens of Yachats. The updated plan, once adopted, will serve as a guide for land use planning within Yachats. It establishes policies and land use designations which will be implemented throughout the City's zoning and land use ordinance.

The Yachats Comprehensive Plan provides goals, guidelines and standards for decision makers, including City employees and officials, citizens, developers, community groups, and other local, state, regional, and federal agencies. The Plan is organized around the Statewide Planning Goals and address natural resources, natural hazards, recreation, urban growth, public services, land use, housing, transportation, public involvement and other related issues.

The update to the Comprehensive Plan has been developed through a public process that included consultants, an advisory committee, city staff, the public, the Planning Commission and the City Council. A variety of public involvement opportunities were used, such as a mail-back and Web-based survey, open houses and community discussions, and public hearings with the Planning Commission and now the City Council.

The City Council will hold a public hearing February 14, 2008 to discuss and consider adoption of the updated Comprehensive Plan.



Public Works Year in Review By John McClintock, Public Works Director

2007 was very busy year for the Yachats Public Works Department. The biggest project finally started in

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July with groundbreaking for the new wastewater treatment facility and pump station replacements. By the end of the year, the project was about 25% complete. The anticipated completion date is December 2008. Upgrades were completed at the water treatment plant with new disinfection methodology changing from gaseous chlorine to on-site production of sodium hypochloride, a much more safe and cost-effective application.

We continue to pursue final water rights certification on the Yachats River. Included in the Administration Order for the rights was for the City to achieve 85%+ efficiency in the water distribution system. We have reached this goal and intend to get better with continued leak detection and system upgrades.

Public Works responded to a number of emergency power outages—the most recent at the beginning of December caused by hurricane-force winds.

We have been working with major developments making sure infrastructure is up to City code. Unless it is a private development, the City takes responsibility for that infrastructure once development is approved and accepted. Private infrastructure still has to be up to code, owner maintains.

We anticipate 2008 to be just as busy, if not busier than 2007 for the Public Works Department.

Straight from the Councilor

Beginning in March an alternating councilor will write an article for "The Councilors' Corner." The article will be an "open mike" to write about whatever issue intrigues them, frustrates them, or any topic they are asked about frequently.

To kick off our new segment, I asked them to write a bit about how they came to their jobs as city councilors so we can all get to know them a bit better.

JOEL EVANS, PRESIDENT One of the great things about this community is its welcome to newcomers

to participate in civic affairs. I grew up in a town where if your grandfather had not been born there you'd always be considered something of an outsider. Not in Yachats. There is no political establishment, no "first families." Within a year of becoming a fulltime resident, I was serving on the Yachats Street Commission and the Port of Alsea Board. After 32 years of teaching *about* politics and government, I got a chance to *do* it.

LARRY NIXON My wife and I found Yachats 30 years ago and were able to move here 23 years ago. At that time the smelt runs still were strong and you would find many folks from town down dipping smelt. An old timer told me there were two things to pay attention to in Yachats: 1) If the tide was coming in or going out; and 2: How much fire wood you had in the woodshed.

I was born and raised in Iowa, a state that takes politics very seriously. When I moved to Yachats in 1984, I was invited to a Yachats Streets Committee meeting one evening. It wasn't very long after that I joined the Streets Committee. I then moved up to the Yachats Planning Commission and finally to City Council in 1991. I have learned much of the history of Yachats and have a story for just about everything in town. I believe in middle ground, compromise and keeping all of the hoops the same size for everyone.

The highlight of my year is hooking my old 2-cylinder John Deere tractor to the manure spreader, loading up the Mayor and City Council into said spreader and driving through Yachats in the "La-De-Da" 4th of July Parade. (You can take the boy out the country, but he will always take some of it with him.)

YVONNE WULFF I was appointed to a Council vacancy during Lee Corbin's term as mayor. At the time, I was serving on the Planning Commission and deeply involved in the development of the Yachats Highway 101 Refinement Plan. Moving to the City Council provided me a chance to help implement some of the Plan's features: sidewalks; parking; and improved safety features for pedestrians. And there was the new wastewater disposal plant in the early planning stages, an important step for the long term health of the City.

I tell everyone that being a member of City Council is the best continuing education experience I've ever had.

GREG SCOTT My initial interest in the City was an attempt to understand why Yachats utility bills were so large. This interest developed into annual studies of the utility rate structure and analysis that has been used for rate discussions by the Public Works Commission since 2004. My first introduction to many people occurred during these early utility rate discussions when I presented results from the utility rate model I developed.

Delving deeper into City issues generated questions about how our community should grow and pay for City services needed to serve newly developed property. I believe that demand for housing by retiring baby boomers presents our village with enormous challenges. The current sewer plant upgrade is merely the first installment in our transition to meet future population demands.

In spite of the challenges, our community has reasonable options. We also have a window of opportunity to chart the future course of our village and ensure that costs associated with population increases are apportioned fairly. These are a few of the issues that enticed me into public service.

- If your interest is in infrastructure (water, wastewater, streets, etc.), then Public Works and Streets (1 opening) may be for you. Meetings are the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m.
- Perhaps books are your thing. The Library Commission (1 opening). The Commission meets on the 1st Monday of each quarter.
- Last, but far from least, is the City's Budget

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Committee (2 openings) which meets in May for the purpose of recommending the City's budget to Council for adoption. There are ten members of this committee, five of whom are the City Council. The remaining five are citizens at large. Budget experience is helpful but not necessary.
