## Mayor's Message By Ron Brean, Mayor

On the Sunday, July 19<sup>th</sup> I was a participant in an event that proved to be quite moving and enlightening. It started out, when I penciled it in on my calendar, to be one of those obligations that fall to mayors. I was to participate in the dedication of a trail. Though I am extremely fond of trail amenities and found this obligation to be a pleasant one, I still thought of it as something I *had* to do. It turned out to be something I would not have wanted to miss, mayor or not.

The event was the dedication of the final link of Amanda's Trail. The City acquired grant funds from Oregon State Parks to complete the remaining link between Yachats and the existing Amanda's Trail, thereby making it possible to walk from Yachats to the Cape Perpetua Scenic Area. That by itself is a grand reason to celebrate. Citizens and visitors to Yachats have long expressed their support of walking trails and their desire for more. I will not give you all of the details here, but suffice it to say that 35 years of effort by many dedicated people made it possible for this wonderful trail to be finished.

Here's the part that made it really special. Amanda was a Coos Indian woman of the 1860's. She was blind. She had a child who was half white. It was an incredibly dark day in the evolution of our understanding of human rights in this country and the laws of the time required that Native Americans be rounded up and imprisoned. The Coos people were force-marched to the Alsea Substation in what

is now Yachats. Amanda was separated from her child and made to walk the treacherous, sometimes jagged lava rock trail from the south to the substation. She was blind and barefoot, but forced to keep up. Her blood laced the trail from her home to her prison. Amanda's Trail was named for her that we might never forget the evil oppression that was our nation's policy at the time.

The descendants of Amanda's people have never forgotten. Yachats, the place that we love, call home, and where we are because we want to be here has been a place synonymous with hatefulness and oppression to them. In spite of that, they came to the dedication. Chief Warren Brainard of the Confederated Tribes of the Coos, Lower Umpqua, and Siuslaw Indians as well as tribal elders and tribal members joined with us to celebrate the trail opening, but more specifically to recognize together what that trail route once meant.

We did that formal ceremony, that obligation. Then, at the request of the Chief some of us traveled to the Amanda statue. In a lovely and peaceful streamside grotto the statue stands as a poignant reminder of how cruel people have sometimes been and how we should all guard against anything that remotely resembles that cruelty. About forty people had found their way up the trail to the site. A wreath was placed at the base of the statue. Beautiful and sorrowful notes of a hand carved flute filled the air. All were silent. All were reverent. All of us were together as people. We were not divided by our various ethnicities. We were one.

I will let you draw your own conclusions as to what this may mean to you as a citizen of Yachats and what I, as Mayor, may be trying to tell you. Your conclusion will be more valid than one I might ascribe. I just know that this dedication event, this obligation I had, was a very special Yachats occasion. People who care made the trail happen. People who care came to celebrate. People who

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care came to remember. The people of Yachats are people who care, who give, who contribute, who reach out, and who remember. I'm glad to be one of you.



## **Natural Disaster Imminent on Oregon**

James Roddey, Earth Sciences Information Officer (Public Education Team) for the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Studies, was a special guest speaker at the July 9<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting.

Mr. Roddey reported that with recent research being compiled relating to the underwater landslides in the Pacific Ocean, scientists have concluded that the length of time between mega-events such as earthquake/tsunamis has been drastically changed. Scientists were previously predicting every 300-500 years between Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquakes/tsunamis. It is now predicted that within the next 50 years, Oregon will experience another Cascadia event.

With this in mind, now is the time to prepare. Yachats area residents can receive emergency response and preparedness training free of charge. *Unit One* of CERT (Citizens Emergency Response Team) training is scheduled for August 29, 2009, at 9:00 a.m. in Room 8 of the Yachats Commons. ## **Lincoln County Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan**

Lincoln County just completed development of the multi-jurisdictional Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan (NHMP). The mission of the NHMP is to promote public policy and mitigation activities that will enhance the safety to life and property from natural hazards.

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The NHMP includes a City of Yachats addendum that focuses on natural hazards that could affect Yachats including coastal erosion, earthquakes, floods, landslides, tsunamis, wildfires, windstorms and droughts. Upon adoption by Lincoln County, Yachats and other cities in the county will be eligible to apply for Federal disaster mitigation funds.

The Yachats addendum provides a set of actions that aim to reduce the risks posed by natural hazards through education and outreach programs, the development of partnerships, and the implementation of preventative activities such as land use or storm water management plans.

Protecting the environment is everyone's responsibility. We ask that users do not flush or pour down the drain any unused medications or toxic materials.

Hazardous waste, i.e., paints, etc. should be properly disposed of through Lincoln County Solid Waste District. They can be reached at (541) 265-4171 for details.

Unused medications should be poured into a sealable plastic bag. If the medication is solid crush it or add water to dissolve it then add kitty litter, saw dust, or coffee grounds to the plastic bag. Seal the plastic bag and dispose of it in the trash.

**Complete CERT**  
**Training**

On June 8th Yachats City employees started CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training at the Yachats Fire Station. CERT training covers nine units, a written test, and disaster simulation for a total of 20+ hours. All employees passed training with flying colors. Thanks also to our instructors, Frankie Petrick, Sheila Corley, and Adam Wilkinson.

In an event such as an earthquake or tsunami, our City employees now have the knowledge and training to assist those in the Yachats area after a disaster. What research shows is if people who are not properly trained try to help others they may actually become victims themselves.

South Lincoln County now has a total of 17 CERT trained personnel available to assist the fire and rescue units in the area during an emergency. That's about one CERT member per 222 people in South Lincoln County!

All South County residents can take CERT Training free of charge. Even if you have issues that you feel may prohibit you from being an active participant in CERT, being CERT trained is an asset to the entire community.

There is free disposal available in Toledo for those who are still clearing yard debris, but you must haul the material yourself. Forecasts for dry weather this summer makes it especially important that you follow Yachats Municipal Code 5.08.110 Section C 2 about trimming the vegetation on your property. Keeping lots trimmed reduces the fire potential tremendously.
