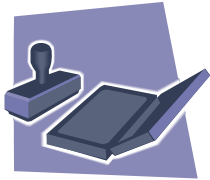

VARIANCE APPLICATIONS

This is the fourth of eight descriptions of different types of land use and building permit applications that the City processes.

What is a Variance?

A variance is a relief given where enforcement of the zoning code would result in unnecessary hardship to a particular property. A property owner may request a variance to zoning ordinance standards. Variance requests are typically for reduced building setbacks, increased building height, increased lot coverage and other identified standards. A variance may not be granted to allow a use of the property that is not identified as a permitted use in the zoning district. For example, a variance cannot be granted to allow a retail establishment in the R-1 Residential Zone.

Circumstances for Granting a Variance

A variance may be granted only in the event that the Planning Commission finds that all of the following circumstances exist:

- A. Exceptional or extraordinary circumstances apply to the property which do not apply generally to other properties in the same zone or vicinity, and result from lot size or shape, legally existing prior to the date of the ordinance codified in this title, topography, or other circumstances over which the applicant has no control;
- B. The variance is necessary for the preservation of a property right of the applicant substantially the same as owners of other property in the same zone or vicinity possess;
- C. The variance would not be materially detrimental to the purposes of this title, or to

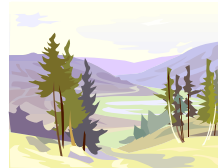
property in the zone or vicinity in which the property is located, or otherwise conflict with the objectives of any city plan or policy;

- D. The variance requested is the minimum variance which would alleviate the hardship;
- E. The hardship asserted as a basis for the variance does not arise from a violation of the zoning ordinance.

History of Variance Approvals

Only three variances have been approved in Yachats during the past 15 years.

Yachats Public Library

We all have ideas about what "community" means, especially here in Yachats. Keeping the small village atmosphere is the number one concern for our residents. With that in mind, the library would like to recommend a fascinating book about the beginning and early times in the Yachats River Valley.

We recently received several copies of the desktop published book The Valley Called Home. If you ever wondered about the original settlers of this area and their descendents, this is the volume to read. There are pictures, poems, old newspaper articles and reminiscences by the early residents. The early homesteads are listed and mapped. There is a chapter devoted to the schools: the first was established in 1886. Another chapter is all about Axtel Creek and the Yachats River sub-agency while another tells us about the early community.

When the editor first began collecting information in 1993, there were only two of the "old timers" living in the valley. However, they had a wealth of remembrances. Howard Howell (born 1913 in Waldport) kept a 50 year diary. The entire 40+ pages are included in this book. Readers will get a real sense of how people survived during the Great Depression and the World War II years.

Yachats Community Park is now a Certified Wildlife Habitat

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF) now recognizes the Yachats Community Park as a Certified Wildlife Habitat. The kids from the Yachats Youth and Family Activities Program worked with staff and volunteer Betty Bahn to complete the application process.

This site attracts a variety of birds, butterflies, and other wildlife. In order to be certified, a site must employ sustainable gardening practices and must provide the 4 basic elements all wildlife need: food; water; cover; and places to raise offspring. The NWF has certified 2900 schools and hundreds of business and community sites. Certified habitats can be found everywhere from post offices, hospitals, and places of worship, to community parks, corporate buildings and municipal facilities. In addition to providing for wildlife, this type of

habitat area helps in conserving our natural resources while helping protect the local environment by reducing or eliminating the need for fertilizers, pesticides, and/or irrigation water which ultimately protects air, soil, and water throughout our community. Throughout the certification process the kids have become increasingly aware of the natural world surrounding them as they play on the playground after school. They use the Yachats Community Park as a learning lab for native plant identification, wildlife observation, noxious weed identification and removal, and activities such as nature journaling, photography, and berry picking. The kids built nesting boxes and put them up last year and most recently finished a couple bat boxes and are ready to put them up next. They are still waiting for the arrival of an Osprey though.
